Academy Park High School

SeaGlide Competition

Temple University and the Naval Surface Warfare Center - Caderrock Division (NSWCCD) hosted a group of Academy Park students at a two-day training to prepare for the upcoming SeaGlide Robotics Competition. Students from 22 area schools are slated to participate in the competition, which will take place in March 2018.

The students received instruction on underwater gliders and autonomous underwater vehicles (AUVs). In teams, they built a basic SeaGlide and learned advanced Arduino coding. Moving forward, students will collaborate on modifications that will enable their glider to gather underwater data pertinent to the mission that will provide their craft with an edge in the competition. The student team will also work together on a research paper, create a commercial highlighting the abilities of their craft, participate in a panel discussion, and complete a performance demonstration.





Malcolm Bevans, a senior member of the robotics team, commented about the training, "The experience was very enriching, not only teaching us more about Arduino programming, but by providing insight into how to modify our SeaGlide craft, as well. It also gave us a great preview of what the competition has in store for us."

The SeaGlide program's mission is to impact high school students in the STEM meta-discipline and inspire them to pursue careers in engineering, science and technology through participation in a sports-like science and engineering-based robotics competition.

The SeaGlide program provides high school teams with an opportunity to expand their STEM engagement beyond what is currently offered in the current SeaPerch program.

Inaugural Season for Girls' Soccer

The Academy Park girls' soccer team completed their inaugural season. The program was initiated by Academy Park student, Maryam McClain. In the first year of competition, there were 23 students who participated in the program.



Academy Park social studies teacher and coach for the team, Mr. Erik Jones, set three main goals for the players as they progressed through the season.

- 2. Develop a team identity
- 3. Have fun

Mr. Jones stated, "During the season, the team accomplished all three of those objectives and are continuing to improve during the off season. It has been a pleasure to see the team progress and I cannot wait to see the continued development into next year."

The leading goal scorer this year was Blessing Worjloh (senior). The midfield was anchored by Natthaline Briggs (junior) and the defense was led by Maryam McClain and Camryn Washington (both seniors).
